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Team "KHANDELWAL" Lead after 6 Rounds in Team of Four

The Tournament started yesterday with the Team of Four event for the "Naresh Tandan Trophy". This year the tournament broke its old record of 70 teams participation, with 73 teams from all corners of India along with DATA STEEL & CANDYLAND team from Karachi, Pakistan participating in the Team of Four event. A combined India-Pak team BEEZEE is also participating in the tournament.

Dhampur Sugar Mills, Formidables, Tolani Shipping, Shri Radhey, J.P. Goenka, Alok Daga, Shree Cement, Texan Aces, Wellknit and Manyavar are some of the top Indian teams participating.

At the end of first day (after 6 rounds), **KHANDELWAL**, comprising of Rajeev Khandelwal, Himani Khandelwal, N.K. Gupta & Sandeep Thakral lead the event with **128 VPs**. They beat Chinmoy's IV by 23-7 (1st Round), SECL by 25-1 (2nd round), lost 12-18 to Maheshwari in the 3rd round, won by 22-8 against Shri Radhey in the 4th round, won by 21-9 against NEST Inn and beat COSMOS by 25-5 in the 6th round to take the day's top honours.

MANYAVAR (Raju Tolani, Ajay Khare, Rajesh Dalal, Anil Padhye) & **J.P. GOENKA** (J.P. Goenka, Badal Das, S.N. De Sarkar, Sumit Mukherjee, Amarnath Banerjee, Debbrata Majumder) share the second place with **118 VPs.** Shri Cement (114), Shri Radhey (113), Pushpak (113), Maheshwari (112), PBA-I & Dhampur Sugar Mills (110) are holding the 4th to 9th positions respectively.

Today it is going to be far more competitive as teams lagging behind will try to catch up for the Quarter Final berths. There will be 4 more rounds before the Quarter Finalists are identified. The top teams requiring some extra work to do today are WELLKNIT (100 VPs), CANDYLAND (100 VPs), FORMIDABLES (99 VPs), DATA STEEL (99 VPs), TOLANI SHIPPING (97 VPs), TEXAN ACES (95 VPs), SOUMITRA "B" (91 VPs).

The OPEN PAIRS event starts today evening and a record number of entries are expected in the Pair event also, considering the large participation in the Teams event.

The first elimination will consist of 2 sessions of 20/22 boards. The participants will play in 6 sections.

Over the last few years, there has been a steady interaction between Pakistan and Indian Bridge players, as teams from the two countries participate regularly in major tournaments held in the other country. If Balijee Memorial Tournament of Lahore attracts quite a few Indian teams, without doubt it is the HCL Tournament of India which attracts participation of teams from Pakistan. This time around, there are about 14 Pakistani players here, including the Data Steel team from Karachi which was doing wonderfully well at one stage of the Transnational Event during the last BFAME Championships at Karachi, including sharing a match against Jose Damiani's team which included the redoubtable Zia Mahmood.

We have with us in this tournament three important officials from the Pakistan Bridge Federation. Azwerul Haque (he has come along with his wife, Zeenat), Ihsan Qadir and Tariq Rashid Khan.

Azwer was a banker before he joined his wife's fashion design business and he has been the 'moving force' of all BFAME activities as its Honorary Secretary. They live in Karachi.

Ihsan Qadir from Lahore, is also a business man but his passion is Bridge. He is a very highly respected Tournament Director (ask Ton Kooijman, Executive Director in technical charge of several tournaments in Europe and elsewhere) and has been regularly officiating in European, BFAME and other tournaments.

If you wanted to know Tariq, you should have been present at Karachi during the last BFAME. He literally carried the organization of that BFAME on his shoulders. He is a highly successful business man in the construction industry and, like Azwer, is a delightful conversationalist, never groping for an English word.

A very, very warm threesome, indeed.



WHEN A GUESS IS INEVITABLE......

A common lament of many Bridge players is when a contract depends on a pure and simple guess. Be that as it may, when you look at the totality of the contract, very often it would turn out that other factors like communication between the two hands *would necessitate* the 'guess decision' be taken early on in the play.

Raju Bhiwandkar, playing for Shri Radhey in the closed room, demonstrated the above concept beautifully in his team's round two match against Pankaj Mehta's team. The open room declarer, Satyabrata Lahiri went down in five clubs while Raju's partner Vinay Mohan Lal stretched to bid six clubs and Raju made it.




Lahiri, as declarer in five clubs, got a spade lead. When he tried to ruff all three of dummy's losing spades, the last one with the queen, Ajit Chakradeo (West) discarded a heart and the hand crumbled thereafter. Ajit got an undeserved third round heart ruff and Lahiri misguessed in diamonds, the contract went one down.

Raju Bhiwandkar was in *six clubs* when ¼al pushed him to that contract (These IAS officers are all alike; they push you to your best performance levels!). And Raju got the more obvious trump lead. Raju won in hand, played a spade to the ace, ruffed a spade, a heart to the ace and another spade ruff and the second heart to the king put him on the table. Realising that there are going to be communication problems and that there was no way he could avoid a diamond guess, he pulled a diamond and guessed correctly. Even a shrewd duck by West did not deter Raju; he continued with another diamond and was home and dry, as the heart suit was kindly to him. Played this way, can you make the contract if hearts are 4-2? I leave it to you to work that out.

The six rounds played yesterday produced many slams. Here are some interesting slams made by players.

Players are scary about opening 11 HCPs hand, but UK Pal (West) & P.K. Neog (East) of IOCL bid the little slam with 11 HCPs each in both hands. The lead was SK and there was nothing in the play a diamonds became good and declarer was able to ruff one of the dummy's spade in hand.
