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## "MAGIC EYES" Team Leads after 6 Rounds in Team of Four Event

The Tournament started yesterday with the Team of Four event for the **"Naresh Tandan Trophy"**. An excellent turnout of **89 teams -** including 11 foreign teams, which participated in the recently concluded 3<sup>rd</sup> Commonwealth Nations Bridge Championship and 78 teams from all parts of India, was seen in action the Team of Four event.

Texan Aces, Dhampur Sugar Mills, Formidables, Shree Cement, Poddar Developers, Promila Saraf, Hemant K. Jalan, Arun Jain, and Maya Meera Sneha are some of the top Indian teams participating. The foreign teams are Magic Eyes from Thailand, Hackett from England, Scotland, Sri Lanka, Hans from Australia, Braithwaite from Australia, England, Bangladesh, Kenya (Ahwin), Kenya Safari Group & Uganda.

At the end of first day (after 6 rounds), **MAGIC EYES**, comprising of Rhunying Chodchoy, Somchai Baisamut, Vallapa Svangsopakyl, Asdang Riamsree abd Charnchai Svangsopakyl lead the event with **122 VPs. Shree Cement** (Kamal Roy, S.P. Ghosh, Badal Das, P.S. Mukherjee, V.M. Lal, R. Bhiwandkar) are in second place with **120 VPs.** Hemant K. Jalan (114) is in 3<sup>rd</sup> place and Sunil Team is in 4<sup>th</sup> place with 113 VPs. The 5<sup>th</sup> & 6<sup>th</sup> place is shared by Arun Jain & Hackett with 112 VPs. At 7<sup>th</sup> place is HANS, Australia with 111 VPs and England team is on 8<sup>th</sup> place with 108 VPs.

Today it is going to be far more competitive as teams lagging behind will try to catch up for the Quarter Final berths. There will be 4 more rounds before the Quarter Finalists are identified. The top teams requiring some extra work to do today are Dhampur Sugar Mills, Promila Saraf, Scotland (107 VPs), Formidables (105 VPs), Poddar Developers (102) & Texan Aces (92).

The top 8 teams will qualify for the 3\*14 boards quarter-finals. 2 sessions of the quarter-finals will be played today evening and will be webcast on BBO.

The OPEN PAIRS event starts today evening and considering the large participation in the Teams event, a large number of entries are expected in the Pair event also.

The first elimination will consist of 2 sessions of 20/22 boards. The participants will play in 6-8 sections. The first session of elimination-I will be played today evening and the  $2^{nd}$  session will be played tomorrow morning.



The open room auction came alive when Subhash probably playing Capellati bid 2H to show Hs and a minor. Who the hand belonged to no one knew till the dummy came down.

The live auction saw north get in with 2S. What is poor East to do holding two doubletons. Looks like partner has the red suits. So east passed. South raised to 3S and Subhash doubled to show a better hand. East bid 4C expecting parner to bid his red suit and must have been surprised to become the declarer. South Pass 4C, which was the killer bid, as it transpired, even though 4S is a toss at the wall.

The closed room auction was equally esoteric. West bid 2C, DON'T, to show clubs and another suit making life less complicated for partner. North got in with 2S and east after freely bidding 3C took the save!, bidding 5C over south's duly bid and making game bid of 4S. He got duly whacked and was very pleasantly surprised when 5C doubled was made by hjs partner. Declarer ruffed the spade lead and played the DQ, won by south, who shifted to the HK. Winning the HA, he cashed the DJ, ruffed a spade in hand and threw his losing heart on the diamond king. South was welcome to ruff.That was the the last trick for the defence. Declarer lost the DA and a ruff.

The I-Doctors from Mumbai treated themselves to a 9 Imp pick up thanks to the DON'T system.





Next came the DA, spade ruff in hand, CA, club ruff, DK, spade ruff, DQ, club ruff, SQ, covered, ruff, over ruffed by east with HQ. Declarer had scored three diamonds, CA and two club ruffs, HA, and two spade ruffs for nine tricks. This is the scenario in the three card ending:

Here's what happened. East opened 2H and it Pass-Pass. North had a perfect double. He put the red Dbl card and East put the Pass card. The tray went to the other side and came back empty. The play got over and when they scored South got a shock when +470 was entered in the EW column. She thought she was defending 2H undoubled! She hadn't seen the double. And neither had west who was her screenmate, a fact that he corroborated. What had happened apparently was that the tray wasn't pushed **far enough** for south and west to see the Double.

No redress for north-south. The director ruled that the table result stands since the onus is on North- South to handle the tray. Formidables lost an unfortunate 8 Imps for a silly reason. They didn't push hard enough

The lesson to be learnt is that push the tray sufficiently forward, especially if you are north-south.
